

### **Sample Home Safety Checklist**

Check safety steps that are being taken in your home. Write N/A if the item is not applicable, Items left blank may present a safety hazard. This list provides some sample safety steps you

might take. See your Safety Merit Badge pamphlet and counselor for more information. Ask	your parent or guardian before making any changes
Stairways, Halls, and Outdoor Steps	Attic and Basement
Stairways with three or more steps have a strong handrail.	Ladder is strong, solid, and sturdily constructed.
Stairs/halls are kept free from boxes, toys, brooms, tools, etc.	Stairway is sturdy and well lit.
Gates at top and bottom of stairs prevent children from falling.	Walls and beams are free from protruding nails.
The head and foot of stairs have no small or loose rugs.	Fuses or circuit breakers are the proper size.
Stair carpeting or covering is fastened securely.	Rubbish & flammable materials are in covered metal cans.
Stairways & halls have good lighting, controllable at each end.	Wastepaper is kept away from furnace and stairs.

Bathroom	An area is marked off in the garage for bicycles, wagons, etc.
Tub and shower are equipped with strong handholds.	Lawn mower is equipped with proper safeguards.

Poisons are marked, sealed shut, and out of reach of children.	Good ventilation exists, especially when sanding.

Living Room and Dining Room	All electrical tools are either three-wire or double-insulated.
Furniture is placed to allow easy passage in an emergency.	Work area is well lit & free of clutter, scraps, and rags.
Before bedtime, furniture placement is checked for orderliness.	All tools have a place & are in their place.
Furniture and woodwork are solid, in good repair, and free from Fireplace screen fits snugly.	Guards are in place on all power tools.
Rugs are fastened or laid on non-slip pads.	A push stick is available for use with power saws.  Electrical Devices and Fixtures

Stoves are away from curtains.	Children are never permitted to play with matches.
Stoves & furnaces are inspected & cleaned annually.	Fire extinguishers are readily available.
Gas burners are properly adjusted and free from leaks.	For Emergency
Gas water and space heaters are equipped with vents or flues.	Know how to get emergency help (911, poison control, etc.).
